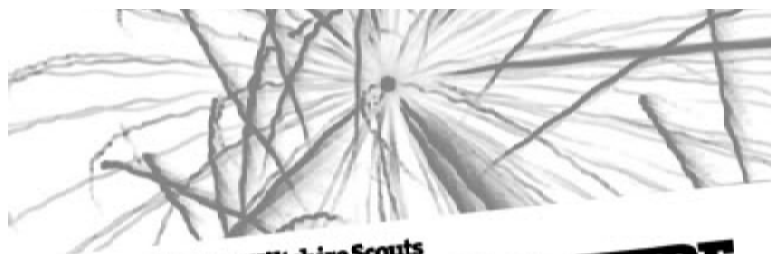

Parish Council News



Widham Farm – we are delighted with the outcome of the inquiry which rejected the applicant's appeal against the decision of Wiltshire Council to refuse a development of 50 dwellings on this site. A great deal of work went into presenting the Parish Council's case; likewise that of our Unitary Councillor Jacqui Lay and other members of the community such as Dr Richard Pagett on behalf of Ps & Qs. Our thanks are extended to all of those who contributed to bring about this outcome.

Ridgeway Farm – the outcome of this Inquiry is still unknown but a decision from the Secretary of State is expected by 1 November.

Neighbourhood Plan – Cricklade and Royal Wootton Bassett have decided not to continue with the Neighbourhood Plan for the Royal Wootton Bassett and Cricklade Community, now proposing to develop individual Plans for their respective towns. This leaves Purton, and the other parishes within the Community Area, with some difficult decisions to make as to whether they should continue with a joint Plan for the Community Area, but without Wootton Bassett and Cricklade, or develop Plans for their individual villages, either solo or in conjunction with some or all of the remaining Parishes. Alternatively we could opt out of producing a Neighbourhood Plan at all, though this could leave us with little defence against inappropriate development taking place in the village. More will be known after a steering group meeting on 17 October. It is likely that Purton Parish Council will call an extraordinary Council meeting after this date to consider its options.

As with all of these things, cost implications will need to be considered. Under the Front Runner Scheme, the Neighbourhood Plan for the Community Area was essentially funded by Central Government. If, as expected Cricklade and Royal Wootton Bassett continue with their Neighbourhood Plans, then they will have to fund these themselves and that could be quite costly. Purton will be faced with the same considerations and the upshot is that there may have to be a significant increase in the Parish Council Precept for next year to cover our Plan. Careful consideration will need to be given to all options and investigation is under way to explore all avenues.

The Fox – you may recall that in last month's Magazine details were given about the metro count that was carried out in The Fox, resulting in the possibility of a Community Speed Watch group being set up to carry out speed checks. We are pleased to report that eight people have put their names forward. We would like more people to come forward to help if possible – if you are interested you do not have to be a resident of The Fox. Please contact the Parish Council Office with your details and we will pass them onto the co-ordinator for the scheme.

Remembrance Service – Purton High Street will be closed from the Lower Square to the entrance of The Peak from 2.15 pm until 3.15 pm on Sunday 11 November 2012, for the British Legion Remembrance Service.

Bus Shelters – we have just carried out a survey of the bus shelters and note that on occasions people put notices up in them which can make them look untidy and

leaves sticky marks on the windows. Please can you use the noticeboards in the village to advertise events rather than the bus shelters. Thank you.

Ragwort – DEFRA has produced a code of practice on how to prevent the spread of ragwort. Ragwort contains toxins which can have debilitating or fatal consequences if eaten by horses and other grazing animals. Also humans may be at risk from ragwort poisoning through direct contact (e.g. hand pulling) or the consumption of contaminated food. The code does not seek to eradicate it as it is a native plant, and is important for insects to feed on. However it is necessary to prevent the spread where this presents a high risk of poisoning horses and livestock or spreading to field used for the production of forage. The responsibility for control rests with the occupier of the land on which the ragwort is growing. A copy of the code can be obtained from DEFRA, Ergon House, 17 Smith Square, London SW1P 3JR. The code can also be found on the DEFRA web site at www.defra.gov.uk.

Purton & District Age Concern



My word there has been a great deal of sadness in our village through people losing family and friends. We all feel for you and sincerely hope you will gain strength from the thoughts and prayers of the village. You wonder how people cope, especially people like Eric and Roma Dodson who have just lost their daughter **Denise** at a young age compared to others who have been sadly taken from us. All you hear from people who knew Denise is what a home loving person she was, kind, thoughtful and caring. Denise is the second daughter that Eric and Roma have lost and you cannot begin to understand how they have handled two such tragedies.

Sid Walker was a person who was very much a part of Purton. I believe his father had a smallholding in Poor Street where Sid lived with his mum and dad and his six brothers and sisters. Where is Poor Street you might ask? Well it is the footpath that runs down past where the Masons' Arms used to be, or runs parallel to the allotments off Restrop Road. Sid was a very sociable person, the type of chap who was easy to talk to and you usually came away with a smile on your face. Sid was quite involved with the village in various ways and I would think he was one of the last remaining members of the Purton detachment of the Home Guard during the 1939-45 war. He loved bowling and was a member of Purton Bowls Club for years. He maintained the lovely borders around the Club green for a good number of years – they always looked a picture, still do in fact. He also like to put pen to paper and wrote a few small books, many about people he came across in his life. He liked walking and was no mean poet but I would think his greatest love was dancing. He was very nimble on his feet and made many friends – in fact he was still dancing until a short time ago which was good. Sid was a character who will be sadly missed in Purton and beyond. Could we thank family and friends for donations being shared with St Mary's Church and ourselves.

Another person I would like to mention is **Mary Wright** of Hillside in Purton. Mary had been poorly for years and she bore her illness bravely. In days gone by she held the keys for the Village Hall and did the bookings as well so I would imagine a lot of people would have come across her in that role the same as I did. She died quite young for this day and age but the distressing thing is that she has not enjoyed good health for such a long time which took her away from normal life. It is a credit to everyone who cared for her.

Mr Glyn Lloyd is another gentleman who we will miss. Up until about a year ago he enjoyed very good health doing his garden, shopping etc. He was very interested in his garden – I know because, when he was 100 years' old, 18 months ago, he was asked by Age Concern what he would like as a gift from us. He said he would like a plant for the garden so we purchased an acer for him and he and I planted it together. We hope that it is still growing. I mention about him going shopping – well, it would take him about twice as long as it should because former pupils would recognise him and say, 'You don't know me do you?' but invariably he did and he remembered their names as well. He came to teach at St Mary's School before the 1939-45 war. It was quite a daunting task I would imagine, coming here

from the valleys of Wales to a village like Purton. Nevertheless he took it in his stride and became part of Purton. He must have been the last Cricket Club member still with us who played before the war and, of course, the Tennis Club played at the cricket field then. Did he meet his wife up there because the Scott family were keen on tennis – they even had their own courts at Diana Lodge. He had a lifelong love for cricket and particularly Purton Cricket Club.

Mr Lloyd was in the Home Guard before being called up for Army Service and returning as a captain and he then became temporary headmaster at St Mary's School which then had pupils from infants up to the school leaving age. I think the whole village was somewhat surprised that he didn't get the headmaster's job straightaway but he did eventually as we know and it was the same when Bradon Forest opened. Once again the village thought that Mr Lloyd was the man for the job there but that was not to be either, so Bradon Forest's loss was St Mary's gain. While teaching at St Mary's he was their representative at the NUT meetings and then, when made headmaster, he would attend NAHT meetings. Coming from Wales did he have strong union views I wonder?

He was the main instigator of the building of the swimming pool at St Mary's, where so many children first learned to swim. Another of Mr Lloyd's loves was St Mary's Church; he was a Church Warden or should I say Vicar's Warden – Roger Lawrence was the Peoples' Warden. While I think of it, was the Vicar's Warden a job that always went to the headmaster of St Mary's, which was a Church of England school, as Mr Greenhill was Vicar's Warden when he was headmaster. Frank Kempster was the Peoples' Warden then. No doubt, someone will tell me. He was also a Parish, District and County Councillor and, apart from the Cricket Club, his other favourite organisation was the Purton Branch of the Royal British Legion of which he was President.

As I have just said, Mr Lloyd was a Churchwarden and headmaster and this must have been useful, like the time when they had Sunday School children to a special service and there were a couple of boys misbehaving at the front of the Church. Mr Lloyd stormed up the central aisle from the back where the wardens sat. I don't know if he said something or clipped them round the ear but there was no trouble after. One of his favourite sayings when pupils were messing about was 'Empty vessels make most noise'.

He was extremely generous to Purton Age Concern, giving us a generous donation every Christmas, which gave us a great boost to think that someone as well respected as Mr Lloyd should think that our organisation was worth supporting – he would always remind me that once he was taller than me. In fact, his kindness and generosity was something you never knew about unless you belonged to an organisation who benefited from his kindness and not just organisations – it was individuals as well. We shall all miss him.

Another person who has died is Mrs **Hazel Iles** who lived in Reid's Piece originally, before moving to the Cedars and then a nursing home. What do I remember about her most? I can see her riding her bike always looking so smart. She was a great supporter of the village, especially Age Concern, going on our outings, to concerts and various fundraising events – she was one for a bargain and

would always try to knock the price down at jumble sales. I believe she came here from Wales and she was married to Wilf whose brother Harold was probably the last local man to go up the outside of the spire at St Mary's Church in his job as a steeplejack – no health and safety then. Harold used to cut hair in his shed at the bottom of his garden down at the end of Witts Lane – I'm sure you wanted to know that! My word it is a sad time in our village, losing people who, in days gone by, have contributed to making our village what it is today – a grand place to live.

Another such person who has died is Mrs **Doris Wadsworth** nee Hunt of Blacklands. She was not a Purtonian but would qualify as an associate Purtonian the number of years she lived here. Her home was at Shaw in Collier's Row – you don't go by there now but it is still there. At one time it was the main route into Swindon. She went to Lydiard School and had to walk about two miles there (and the same back) in all winds and weathers. I bet she was glad when she reached the age of eleven and went to Purton School as she would have been picked up outside her house by Rimes coach. That was quite a long trip, picking up at various stops like the Nine Elms, Park Lane, Church Place, Lydiard Green and Greenhill Cross Roads. Talking about the Nine Elms, I bet it was frightening in 1927 when two of the elms blew down and killed two people – this would have been the way Doris walked to school when at Lydiard.

In later years Doris worked in the kitchen at Bradon Forest School along with the likes of Phil and Peg Matthews, Iris Parsons and May Barnfield. Was it about that time that Eve Saunders was in charge? They used to put dishes out on the tables with the veg on and Doris would always stick up for the children. They had special processed peas and Doris always complained that they weren't given enough – she never gave up and, in the end, the powers that be listened and the children were given more. She was a very happy go lucky person – when you went by the kitchen all you could here would be laughter – also she was very hard working, never moaning (only about the peas). Later on in life she joined the Bowls Club, becoming captain of the ladies triples - mind husband Reg and son Mark became quite good bowlers as well. She worked hard here as well, helping out with the catering, cleaning etc. and, as was her nature, anything she did was quick and thorough. I have spoken about Mr Lloyd so would Doris have been taught by him when he first came to Purton?

We have had enough bad news but it will be good news when we welcome our new vicar Ian Tweedie-Smith and his family to our village and the added bonus is that they are going to live in Purton and be part of our community – something nice to look forward to. We welcome them and hope they will be very happy in their new surroundings. In welcoming Ian and his family lets not forget all the extra work that those involved with the Church have carried out over these last years while we have been without a vicar. You have all done your best to keep the Church alive, although some decisions I did not particularly agree with, but never mind that. Many thanks to you and to Revd John Railton for stepping into the breach for the past fifteen months, but a special thank you to the Revd Judith Wells for always being there for us. I have just returned from Mr Lloyd's funeral and what an excellent service – Judith took it and it was a very fitting tribute, especially the Welsh choir!

Could we offer our congratulations on their golden wedding to Cyril and Jackie

Walters. Both are not enjoying the best of health at the moment – Cyril is in the Cedars and Jackie is in a nursing home in Swindon. We in Age Concern have so much to thank them for. Jackie was street warden for the Peak and a very good one too. Cyril was one of our early minibus drivers but bad health forced him and Jackie to give it all up. They were both valued members of our committee for twenty plus years – the type of people who would be first to come forward when anything wanted doing. If they said they would do something you knew it would be done. We all send you our best wishes and thank you both for all you did for Purton Age Concern over the years.

Our final mystery tour of the season seemed to be enjoyed by all. The weather was kind to us and the route took in Calne, Marlborough, Hungerford, Wantage, Kinston Bagpuize and Bablock Hythe, where we stopped at the Ferryman Inn for lunch. It was something different for us but very enjoyable and you could have a drink while they prepared the food – a roast chicken dinner with a choice of sweets – I chose lemon sponge, which was delicious. The homeward trip took in Bampton, Kencot, Lechlade, Highworth and Blunsdon. We are planning next year's trips – come and give them a try.

We are still getting good reports of the Bobby Van for security and the Fire Service for smoke alarms. If you are interested, contact your street warden. We are also preparing to give out our Christmas vouchers – the criteria – single men 65 and over, single ladies 60 and over, married couples men 65 and over, wife 60 and over.

We will be having our usual two Christmas parties – the less able party on Saturday 24 November at the Silver Threads Hall from 3 to 5 pm., cost £2 – names to street wardens by 15 November – and the party for the able elderly on the following Saturday 1 December from 5 to 8.30 pm. at the Village Hall, cost £5 – names to street wardens by 22 November. Following on from there we will be holding our Christmas Market Stall at the Pavenhill shops on Saturday 8 December and in between times our Christmas raffle tickets will be on sale and, of course, we will be hoping to put our Christmas tree up outside the Institute ready for our carols with hot punch and mince pies on Christmas Eve – this is our thank you to you all for the way you support us.

I am sorry to have to report that Richard Woodbridge, our minibus co-ordinator, is giving up the job in two months time. We are very grateful to Richard for his services – he has been doing such a good job for eight years, ably assisted by his wife Hazel and we have so much to thank him for. The good news is that Richard and Hazel are going to continue to drive the buses. You know what the next question is going to be – would anyone care to take this rewarding job on. I must stress, as with everything involving Purton Age Concern, it is purely voluntary. If you would like to know more, give me a ring on 770696.

I had finished my piece for the magazine, and it was with great sadness that I heard of the death of Mrs **Lilian Slade**. Ron and Lilian Slade have had a long and happy life together. Mrs Slade was in the RAF and Ron was in the Navy when they met. It is going to be very difficult for Ron without Lilian as they have always been together, married for 68 years and, of course, the courting before getting married. Mrs Slade, during her married life worked for a good number of

years for a firm of solicitors in Old Town, Swindon. Eventually Ron and Lilian moved out from Old Town to Purton to be close to their daughter Lyn and son-in-law Ted. I say 'close' – they had a granny annexe built on to Ted and Lyn's bungalow in Glevum Close. It is particularly sad for Bowls Club members as Ron is quite heavily involved with the Club. I know at Christmas time, as a token of his appreciation, he cooks all the helpers who maintain the Club a Christmas breakfast and it is some breakfast I can tell you.

Mrs Slade is a person I have always had the greatest respect for – the type of person, if I were a lady, I would want to be like – very elegant, always smartly dressed – the term I would use is 'nicely turned out'. Doom and Gloom...Winter is upon us...

As I write this the sun is shining and I could almost be fooled that we may have an Indian Summer? Sadly, I know this is unlikely and we are looking at cooler and wet weather over the next few months. Just a few thoughts:

Electricity bills: did you change supplier last year to make the most of the low tariffs on offer? If so now is the time to check your bill to ensure that you are still receiving electricity at a competitive rate. Search engines such as www.gocompare.com or www.moneysupermarket.com are an excellent way of checking if you can save cash on bills. I can do these checks if you have no access to the Internet

Oil costs: Did you know that Community First have a county wide oil purchasing consortium? It costs just £20 per year to join and this can be less than the saving on your first oil order. Oil can be ordered monthly and your order can be as little as 500 litres, but everyone pays the same price (often smaller orders are more expensive per litre). Last year members saved up to 6p per litre on their purchases. Payment for the oil is direct to the supplier and there is no surcharge for using credit cards. For more details call Jess on 01380 732809.

Darker evenings are a burglar's friend: Think about having some motion censored outside lights installed. They are an inexpensive way of deterring unwelcome visitors.

Beware of doorstep traders: Uninvited workmen calling to offer repairs to gutters, roofs etc. may be opportunists hoping to carry out unnecessary work on your home. If you do need repairs to your home, call a reputable company and seek advice and a quote.

Beware cold callers: All utility companies issue their staff with ID badges and wear them. Always ask for identity from visitors who claim to be from utility companies. If in doubt, turn them away and check with the company they claim to be representing.

Ian Tweedie-Smith - This is my Life

By the time you read this Ian will have been licensed as our new vicar by Bishop Mike of Bristol. Ian was asked to prepare a biography for the order of service used at his licensing which we thought would be of interest to the whole village.

DAVID NETTLETON, Churchwarden, St Mary's Church

I was born in Aldershot in 1960, and brought up on a farm in Mattingley (near Hook). When I was 6 we moved to Fleet (all in North-East Hampshire) and lived in a flat in a large rundown Victorian building called Stockton House – back then it was riddled with dry rot and due for demolition. Much of my school life was in Berkshire and it was there in 1973 that I met a group of Christians. There was something different about them; they had something I had not got. As I met with them I discovered I also met with Christ, or rather Christ met with me. I realised that I too wanted to become one of his followers. As I look back it was the most significant decision of my life and yet as I look back it was a decision that Christ had prepared the way for and enabled me to take.



Soon after, I developed arthritis, which gradually disabled me to the extent I could only walk short distances and could not study because of the constant pain. So I had to leave school part way through my A levels. As I developed arthritis I also developed a sense of calling from God to get ordained in the Church of England. Yet my health and my calling did not seem to match and I went to live in Shipley (in West Yorkshire). I lived in the curate's house and saw a vicar's life first hand. The Church had begun a healing ministry and whilst I was there God graciously healed me of my arthritis and with that He reaffirmed my calling to ordination. I then worked selling kitchens, bedrooms and bathrooms, went back to college, got some A levels and on to University in Newcastle upon Tyne.

Meanwhile I was selected for ordination and moved to Oxford to complete my training. Whilst I was there I got to know Celia, who subsequently proposed to me! My first appointment was to the Inner City – New Cross (South East London) in 1985, and 2 years later Celia and I got married. Then in 1989 we moved to Bury St Edmunds (Suffolk) – George was born in 1991 and Ruth in 1994. In 2002 we moved to Woking (Surrey) for a part-time role as Team Vicar for All Souls' Sutton Green and St Mark's Westfield, also working part-time at a much restored Stockton House in Fleet.

When my father died, an opportunity came to develop and use Stockton House in some way in God's service, and so I decided to establish a Christian Conference Centre there. It is my vision to see Christians (especially those in leadership) supported, encouraged and trained so that their walk with God and their work within the Church is grown and enhanced. There is also a School on the site (An Early Years Foundation for children aged 2-4). My mother began this back in 1968 and

it continues to provide a real service for the local community with the majority of the children receiving government grants. I now have oversight over the School and I believe it is important that Christians support and encourage the provision of education in our society.

Now with our children leaving home – George is a Church Apprentice in Leicester and Ruth has just started studying Geography at Durham University – Celia and I are prayerfully ready for a new challenge. We would value your prayers as I continue part-time at Stockton House and especially as I begin as half-time priest in charge here in St Mary's Purton. Throughout the past almost 39 years since I became a Christian I can truthfully say God has never failed me nor forsaken me (Joshua chapter 1 verse 5), and so together as a family and as a Church community we look to God as we step out in faith in this new chapter of our lives. Thank you for your welcome and your support, it is my prayer that together we might know God and make Him known and discover afresh that He will never fail us nor forsake us in the years ahead.

Exhibit of the Month: Curly Tom

This month's Exhibit comes from a postcard published in 1912, showing a local Purton character known as "Curly Tom" by some, and "pins and Needles" by others. He was a pedlar whose customers were the villagers of north Wiltshire.

During his later years he found it necessary in winter to seek the shelter of the Purton Workhouse of the Cricklade & Wootton Bassett Poor Law Union. Each spring he would ask the Guardians for help and they provided him with five shillings which he would use to buy a stock of pins, needles, bootlaces and other small items. He was able to support himself from his profits at least in the better-weather months of the year.

In both appearance and manner, he was superior to what was expected of a common pedlar, so perhaps his personal qualities helped towards his success, as much as his choice of wares.

He was born in 1810 and lived to be 103, when he died in the Purton Workhouse at the end of December 1913. During his declining years in Purton, he was never allowed to go short of tobacco or be refused a cup of tea.

He had been in failing health for some months and took to his bed just before Christmas. The Swindon Advertiser published a very full obituary of the centenarian on January 2nd 1914, which contained much detail which had not been widely known or recorded elsewhere.

The old man had been an inmate of the Workhouse for almost twenty years and, during the last ten years he had been allowed 'to go whither he willed' by the Guardians. On every possible occasion he walked into the village and, as often as not, made his way to one or other of the public houses where he imbibed strong ale which was often given to him with his tobacco by people who liked to chat to the old man.

He told a reporter shortly before his 103rd birthday, "I was born in Kings Lynn and ... when I was quite young I was taken to London by my father. I went all over the country, Leicester, Northampton and round the south-east coast. I worked at the boot trade. Then the machines came in and smashed up my trade. That's when I started on my travels with a few odds and ends."

Much of the above has been adapted from *Purton's Past** by the late Alec Robbins and his later book *Records & Recollections of Purton & District*.

September: Our meeting was held at Barbara Gosden's home where she enlightened us with an interesting talk on 'art appreciation.'

We began the evening by drawing pencil lines in a pleasing way - mostly curves and wavy lines; then in a irritating way, which resulted in zig-zags and irregular shapes. The exercise was then repeated with cut-out shapes of paper, only this time colour was another consideration. We had a very amusing time completing this task, as you can imagine.

Barbara then showed us some colour slides of work by various artists and we were made aware of the clever use of lines in 'The Scream'. The picture entitled 'The Cypresses' by Van Gogh had no straight lines in the use of brush strokes. Caravaggio's masterpiece, 'The Supper at Emmaus' used clever tones of light and dark and incorporated a cross in the design. Members were also very much impressed by the colours used. Turner's picture entitled 'Approach to Venice' was painted in a very loose style, using a great deal of the artists favourite colour, yellow. Leonardo's striking picture of 'The Lady with the Ermine' showed amazing texture in the painting of her dress and the fur of the animal. Velasquez used the contrast of silk in the sash of Francis I with the shining depiction of his armour.

We then moved on to symbolism, cleverly used in advertising, and we discussed magazine advertisements and their impact upon us. It was interesting to note how opinions differed.

The evening ended with the presentation of four more pictures in modern art. Kandinsky's work entitled 'Yellow, Red, Blue' we found to be rather chaotic. Mondrian's 'Geometric Design' appealed to some members but not all. Rothco's untitled canvas using only two colours relied heavily on texture. We decided that we needed to see this canvas at first hand before we could offer an opinion. The final picture, Natkin's 'Farm Street' offered subtle blending of colours, in the artist's words 'Offering a religious experience.' Everyone appreciated this work, which was new to us and certainly made a lasting impression.

Many thanks are due to Barbara for a fascinating and very informative evening, which must have involved a great deal of research.

October: Fourteen of us managed to fit into Avril's front room to discuss transport. It was supposed to be a quiz but as usual we went on several detours but learnt a lot of new facts, concerning a) who designed the London Underground map? And b) who was the MP to be killed by a train? These were interspersed with cryptic clues. 1) A shirt, a weapon and me? As usual with our meetings we went down many side roads on the way. 2) A very good cowboy film? But we did end up back at the quiz. This was a communal effort, in that the members or perhaps members of their families made up the questions and together we solved the puzzles. 3) Tricks on a mat? 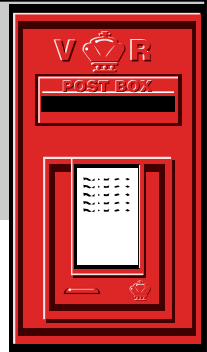

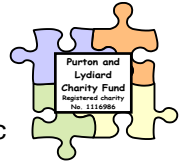

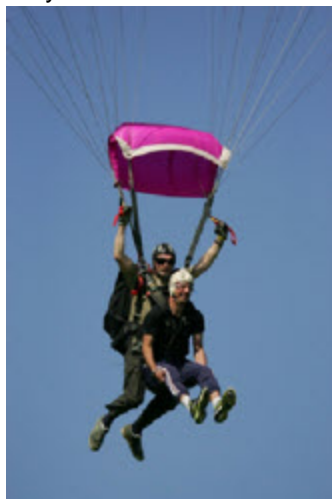
Update On Charity Fundraising In Memory Of Mr Thomas

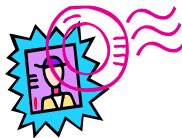

This month's report is dedicated to the contributions made by two cricketers who died recently and a Purton cricketer who is making his way in the professional game with Gloucestershire.

Glyn Lloyd, who died on 29 September 2012, came to the village as a young teacher and soon joined the cricket club, where he was a regular member of teams before the outbreak of war in 1939. He usually opened the batting, not from choice as he remembered, but because other players did not fancy facing fast bowlers on pitches with rather too many plantains growing on a length. He often talked about the club horse which used to pull the gang mowers to cut the outfield and how the horse spent the winter months on Blacklands Farm. His best score was recorded against Shrivensham in 1938 when he scored 64 and he often reminisced about the great rivalry and ribald banter between members in the annual Single v Married fixture. He talked about friendly disputes between cricketers and tennis club members over who should have use of the tearoom first on match days. Glyn was the last link with those who played in the nineteenth century – George Smith, Ewart Iles, Joe Staley and John Shales. Although he never scored a century for Purton he celebrated a century of life, much of which was to the benefit of Purton and its inhabitants.

Sid Walker, who died on 28 September 2012, was one of a small group which restarted cricket after the war in 1945 and became a hard working member of the committee. He was a very sociable person who became a keen, effective secretary of the social and fundraising committee. Amongst other activities he organised club fetes, which in the early 1950's were held at The Court, courtesy of Mr and Mrs A.V. Meyer. The 1950 fete celebrated the club's 130th anniversary. In 1951 he was very busy organising the Prospect Silver Band, the catering, swings for the children, bowls and skittles, hoopla, rifle shooting, pony rides and as gas balloon race. Mr Gibbs of Station Stores providing the ice cream. Although not a strong contender for 1st XI selection he was a good team man and played in the Morse Shield winning side in 1948 alongside the Richards brothers, Pat Hegarty, Harry Barnfield, Alf Tutt, Gordon and Charlie Garrett, Bill Benham, Frank Rudler and captain Tony Smith.

The club was pleased to receive the news that Craig Miles, who has just finished his studies at Filton College, will join the playing staff of Gloucestershire Cricket Club on a new two year contract. Craig played his early cricket at Purton and we wish him well for his future.

A review of the season is postponed again – this time to the December issue.

Green Tips: For Christmas Shopping



Some suggestions when thinking about presents this year:

1. Choose gifts that do not have a great deal of packaging which cannot be recycled
