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## Parish Council News



**Road Closure Lydiard Millicent from 28 July** – Wiltshire Council will be carrying out road re-surfacing works in Lydiard Millicent in two phases so people will not be able to drive through Lydiard Millicent to go to Swindon. During the 1<sup>st</sup> phase closure, two weeks from 28 July until 8 August the road will be closed from Lydiard Green Crossroads to the junction that goes to Washpool. The 2<sup>nd</sup> phase will commence on 11 August for two weeks and the road will be closed from the roundabout that goes to Royal Wootton Bassett and Purton, to the junction that leads to Washpool. Diversion signs will be in place throughout this time. Please be mindful that the diverted traffic will be coming through Purton during the first two weeks of the road closure.

**Volunteers sought to assist with additional Parish planters** – we believe there is support in the Parish for more planters that help brighten up our community. Volunteers would be needed to maintain additional planters. Please contact the Parish Council if you would be interested in volunteering.

**Volunteer Footpath Group** – we also seek more volunteers to help maintain the footpaths in the Parish. Groups usually go out on Tuesday mornings. Please contact the Parish Council if you would be interested in helping.

**Purton Cemetery** – our grounds staff remain busy with grass cutting and strimming, which is a time-consuming task around the headstones. To keep this task as easy as possible please keep any pots/ornaments etc on the base of the headstone to reduce the risk of breakage, and to avoid them causing a hazard when strimming.

**Hedges** – The gardens and hedges in the Parish are growing vigorously at this time of year with an abundance of colour. Just a reminder that if you have a hedge that is close to a road or footpath please ensure it does not cause an obstruction as it grows. The Parish Council receives a lot of calls from local residents about overgrown hedges during spring and summer, so please check to ensure there is no protruding undergrowth that could cause an obstruction or nuisance to others.

Could I say how very sorry we were to hear that Pete and Pat Willis are giving up as our street wardens in Hook. They have been great to have in our organisation and it is through their ill health that they are standing down. It is only their grit and determination that has allowed them to carry on for so long and for this we thank them most sincerely. They have always been so willing to help us in all ways, especially when we were doing a fund raising event (and let's not forget the way you cooked for Lunch Club, Pat). The pair of them have been prepared to help anyone they could. Our thoughts and prayers are with them both and, of course, our grateful thanks for all they have done. The person who will be replacing them is John Strange – a well known Hook person – so our thanks go to John for coming forward.

We celebrated fifty years of Purton and District Age Concern at our AGM this year – what a fifty years it has been with the late Chris May starting it off with the likes of Harold Waldron and a representative from each organisation in the village. I have been involved for thirty-eight years and Chairman for thirty-six – volunteering as a representative from the Workman's Club. (I did actually think I was joining the Carnival Committee and was too proud to admit my mistake when I discovered it was Age Concern!) However, I'm very glad I did and I've enjoyed all these years. We certainly struggled in the early days when we were short of committee members and officers were continually changing but let's be thankful that we are where we are today with nineteen people on our committee, thirty-seven street wardens and twenty-two minibus personnel, plus all of you who are prepared to help and support us at all times. We are very lucky in Purton Age Concern.

There are one or two changes to our organisation that came out of the AGM. I had the greatest honour I could wish for bestowed on me by being elected President – it is a position I shall treasure and honour. It's such a privilege to be President of such an organisation and to follow the late Elizabeth Ward in this job. I was going to stand down as Chairman in any case this year but I didn't expect this honour. I just wanted to serve on the committee. It is a lovely feeling for me to know that Purton Age Concern can continue for another fifty years with the people we have on the committee. Mick Looker has been elected Chairman with Jenny Barnes, our longest

serving member as Vice Chair and Louise Tidman is continuing as secretary and Colin Freemantle as treasurer with Sylvia his assistant. We are lucky enough to have younger people joining our committee and it makes a good blend with the new backed up by us old stagers. At the end of the AGM I had a very pleasant surprise when Mick Looker presented me with a beautiful picture by none other than Catherine Pier. It's of the High Street from the

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vets on down – everyone knows how fond I am of Purton so I couldn't have anything better – it was a very emotional evening with a few tears but I will never forget it, so thank you one and all for something I never expected – it was a marvellous choice.

The evening had a touch of sadness to it as Rita and Alan Webb resigned from the committee, although Rita is staying on as street warden in Hooks Hill for which we are very grateful. They are two people you could always rely on, especially when we were struggling and the people in Purton have certainly benefited from their knowledge and expertise. I remember we were all chatting about food and it was said that you didn't see the really old fashioned spotted dick with suet. We had a jumble sale at the Silver Threads Hall a short time after and the usual procedure was to set it all up and then stop for lunch. Well this particular day Rita said 'I have a surprise for you – come and have your lunch at Hooks Hill'. We were all wondering what the surprise was so off we all go to Hooks Hill. I know there is a cookery quiz about at the moment and, if there is a question on there about who makes the best and biggest suet spotted dick pudding, the answer would have been easy – Rita Webb! – because it was delicious, about eighteen inches long and done properly in a cloth. I've never had one before or after quite like it.

Alan got us interested in our first Carnival entry as he, with friends, had made a 'Thomas the tank engine' model and we dressed up as characters from the stories (I was the Fat Controller!). This was our first Carnival entry and we went on to take part for quite a few years. I could write a book about all the things we've done together in Age Concern and all the fun we've had as well as the hard work and Alan and Rita have been such a big part of it all.

However, we shall still have a tombola so don't worry. All these people have been so kind along with a lot more, too many to mention, but many thanks to you all.

Due to requests and popular demand we are holding another 3Bs evening on Friday 10 October in the Silver Threads Hall at 7.30 pm. I know some of you were disappointed last time because we do not issue tickets on the door. If you are interested and would like tickets give Ron and Heather Harris a ring on 770850. Hope to see you there.

Could we thank The Maharajah restaurant especially Khaliq, Wendy Johnson and Sue Giles for hosting the afternoon tea, the proceeds of which were divided between a charity for disabled children in India and Purton & District Age Concern. It makes me feel a little humble being linked with such a charity as that and from the feedback it was an excellent afternoon so very many thanks to all concerned.

Don't forget about the village diary that Best One has kindly allowed Pauline Ward to put in there. It could save a lot of events clashing, although you are bound to get this happening to one or two with all the things going on in the village. So our thanks here go to the Best One and to Pauline for supplying the diary.

We had another little set-back as Heather Harris who does our printing has retired. 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## Purton Community Café Project

This exciting project began last autumn with a questionnaire being circulated in the village. Since then, a team of interested people has been meeting to plan the way forward. A 'core team' has been formed to focus on market research, finding suitable premises and drawing up a business plan.

Volunteers will be key to the success of the project. Finding committed local people to help set up and run the Café is of paramount importance. Volunteers will be needed for every aspect of the project, from day-to-day running, cooking, management and finance to property maintenance, interior design, and sourcing of equipment.

The location and accessibility of the Café is critical, so careful consideration is being given to finding somewhere that will be suitable for all ages and groups in the village as well as having the potential to attract 'passing trade'. The amount of work needed on the venue will largely determine how much money we need to get the Café up and running. A short list of potential venues has been drawn up and their individual pros and cons are being considered, in discussion with landlords, planners and other interested parties.

Although Purton Community Café is a non-profit making project, it must be financially viable, covering its running costs. We expect the initial start-up costs to be covered by grants and other donations. A group of volunteers visited the Community First organisation in Devizes for advice and guidance.

As the Café project develops, we'll be gathering more detailed information from those who have already expressed an interest in volunteering, and talking to other members of the immediate community in Purton. We will also make the project known in Bentham, Purton Stoke and Lydiard Millicent where there are undoubtedly more potential customers and volunteers.

Updates on progress and decisions will be publicised as widely as possible to keep everyone informed, engaged and involved in this exciting community project.

As a community, volunteer-led venture it's important that we gauge the level of interest both from villagers who wish to use the Café and those who'd like to help run it. ## Mythical Maze Summer Reading Challenge

### from 12 July in Wiltshire libraries

This year the national Summer Reading Challenge for 4 to 11 year olds will run in Wiltshire libraries from 12 July to 6 September, and the theme will be 'Mythical Maze'. The challenge is simple, for children to read six books over the summer, tell us about the books and collect 'rewards' to mark their progress. Incentives this year include a neon green wristband, scratch and sniff stickers, and a medal plus certificate on completion.



Mythical Maze is not a competition, but a fun personal challenge to encourage children to read more and use libraries more. Last year 9,330 Wiltshire children joined the challenge, with 5,803 reading all 6 books and 38,441 books being read in total. Families love the challenge and last year 96% of the participants said that by taking part in the challenge their reading had improved a little or a lot.

Children's reading can 'dip' during the long summer holidays, and The Reading Agency's annual Summer Reading Challenge helps get three quarters of a million children into libraries to maintain their reading skills and confidence. It's free, it's fun and it really can make a difference to a child's love of reading – because everything changes when we read.

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## Wallace & Gromit with the Chicken Run do California

After a great trip to New Zealand with the motorbikes for the International BSA Rally in 2010 we decided, that is Len, myself and The Browns, Dougie and Sara, that it would be rather fun to go to California for the 2014 BSA International Rally. So plans were put in place, firstly arranging for the bikes, our 1953 M33 motorbike and sidecar, Dougie's B175 1970 Bantam and Sara's D7 1965 Bantam, (hence the title) to be shipped out with 23 other bikes from the UK in a container to California they only trouble was it was Long Beach, Los Angeles and the rally was in Petaluma, 40 miles north of San Francisco which was 500 miles away. So out came the maps and a route was planned along Highway 1, which is the coast road.

We arrived safely in LA picked up the bikes, loaded them up and were away.



The first day was hot, hot; hot about 90 degrees but we made it to our first stop at Santa Barbara (of course). The next day was again hot, hot, hot but this time we were out of the built-up area and out into the countryside. The scenery was lovely with the hills to one side and the Pacific Ocean on the other. Next stop Cambria, a lovely town just off the coast where we stayed in a fifties-style motel. We met a couple of guys who were running a sculptor camp just down the road

Then back on the road, passing a beach where there were over 1000 elephant seals basking in the sun, so we stopped and took some photos but you can imagine the smell was a bit ripe. The next day was Mothering Sunday and the roads were empty so we took advantage of it and rode 80 miles along Highway 101 and then stopped for the night at a place called Solvang which is like a Danish theme park with fake storks on chimneys and fake windmills and in the evening all the trees have fairy lights in them, all very twee (get it).

After visiting a very interesting motorcycle museum we were on the road again this time heading for Malibu where a friend of Dougie's lives. ### **Thursday 15 May 2014 – Lights for Learning – Roger Mugridge**

Roger gave a presentation to the Society about the dedicated and valuable work carried out by Cricklade based charity, Lights for Learning. The charity installs solar/battery powered lights in schools and clinics in African Villages that otherwise would have to depend on expensive and hazardous kerosene lamps in order to work after dark. The daylight hours are limited in this part of the world from 6 am to 6 pm and are needed to prepare land, gather and prepare food etc. Lights for Learning enables children and adults to be educated after dark and is also of great importance in Health Clinics.

We learnt about Roger's many interesting trips to install lights and also to train local people how to complete installations. Statistics show that educational standards and the examination pass rates have increased dramatically where lights have been installed. Health Clinics have benefitted, particularly with light being available for babies born during the night and the infant mortality rate has decreased.

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# Great War Project

## Part 12. July (and a bit of August) 1914: The Road to War

Since the 1878 Congress of Berlin, military spending had escalated in most of the European Powers – Germany's by five times, and Britain, Russia, and France had tripled theirs. However spending in the Austrian Empire had not even doubled despite major advances and changes in armaments. The empire had lost ethnic Italian areas to the newly resurgent nationalism in Italy. It also had many territories with a Slav population, and the emergent Serbia was seen as a threat to the empire's holding onto those provinces especially in the south. The Serbian successes and territorial gains at the expense of Turkey in the Second Balkan War of 1913, especially alarmed Vienna and Budapest. Count Alois Ährenthal (d.1912) when foreign minister had overseen the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina in 1908. He had assumed that any future war would be in the Balkan region and that assumption had pointed the empire's military and political policy in that direction.

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On Sunday 28 June 1914, Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir to the Austrian throne, was assassinated in Sarajevo by Serbian nationalists – see Part 11. That same day the Prime Minister of the Hungarian half of the Empire, István Tisza, travelled to Vienna to meet the Minister of Foreign Affairs Count von Berchtold and the Army Commander Conrad von Hötzendorf. Von Berchtold and von Hötzendorf proposed an immediate invasion of Serbia. Tisza, also a social scientist, suggested that they should wait to find out if the Serbian government would confirm or deny its involvement in the assassination. Back home in Budapest, he wrote to Emperor Franz Joseph saying he could not support armed invasion because there was no proof of Serbian involvement. Tisza felt that war with the Serbs would bring an armed response from Russia and a more general European war – he used the term *Weltkrieg* (World War) in his letter, the first known instance of the term. As a Hungarian he was also concerned that, after a successful war against Serbia, Austria would seek to annexe Hungary, reducing its status from being a partner in the Empire and Dual Monarchy to that of a vassal state.

The Emperor was now 84 years old and against anything that smacked of change, including war which he saw as an unnecessary adventure. He was certainly too old to lead the army and had appointed Archduke Friedrich von Österreich-Teschen as Supreme Army Commander but left von Hötzendorf the power to take strategic decisions. And for some years, von Hötzendorf had wanted to confront the resurgent Serbian nation in a preventive war.

Austria's political leaders, including von Berchtold, backed by their ally Germany, decided (5 July) at Potsdam, outside Berlin, to attack Serbia before it could incite a revolt. However they recognised that world opinion would at least require them to take the interim step of an ultimatum. On 23 July, Austria presented Serbia with the "July Ultimatum" – a list of ten humiliating demands which they believed Serbia could never accept – and with a deadline for acceptance by the

Serbian government by 5 pm on the Saturday evening, 25 July 1914 . After much argument and soul-searching, Serbia eventually accepted nine of the ten demands and partially accepted the remaining one. But Austria-Hungary still cut diplomatic ties with Serbia and began to mobilise its forces.

On 28 July, Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia and started a gunnery bombardment of the Serbian capital, Belgrade, only about 50 miles from the empire's border.

The response from Russia must have been expected: that day Tsar Nicolas II ordered a partial mobilisation of forces followed by full mobilisation on 31 July. Germany was Austria's partner in the Triple Alliance and declared war on Russia on 1 August, in response to the Russian defence of Serbia, and mobilised its own forces. The same day, France, in alliance with Russia under the Dual Alliance, also mobilised against an expected attack on France by Germany. And the New York Stock Exchange closed to await developments.

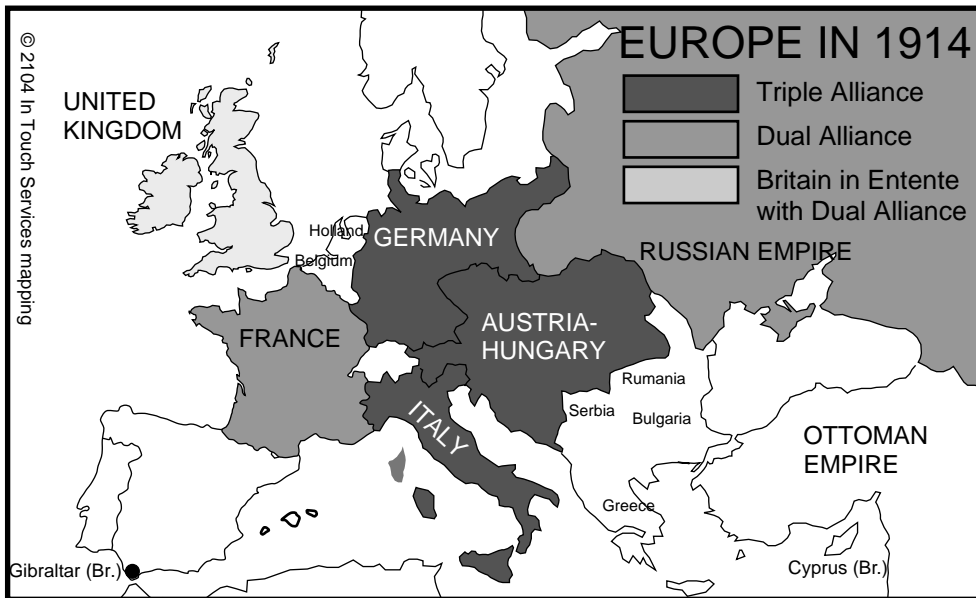
On 2 August, Germany invaded Luxembourg and occupied it in line with its strategic Schlieffen Plan for the conquest of France. Germany also issued an ultimatum to Belgium, with a 12-hour deadline, to allow free passage of German troops towards France.

Believing it would be granted that free passage though Belgium, Germany declared war on France early on 3 August.

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Theory had it that Germany would occupy Paris in 39 days and see the capitulation of France within 42 days. Theory had it that all the dominoes that would fall, had fallen ... and that Britain wouldn't go to war over Belgium. Theory had it that, if the worst came to the worst, 'It will be all over by Christmas'. Theory isn't everything.

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## Purton & District Probus Club



**On 8 April** Dinah Starkey of the Chippenham Civic Society gave the club a talk on the Navvies of Box Tunnel. The accent was on the life style of such men. Work began in 1838. Six vertical shafts were sunk at equal intervals, 25ft in diameter, 70ft deep at the eastern end and 300ft deep towards the western end. Men, equipment and spoil were lifted in and out by steam winches. Blasting, lit by candle light, was carried out while the navvies were in the tunnel. This and water ingress lead to about 100 deaths. The tunnel was eventually opened in 1841 and the census of that year showed that many of the men employed were from local families. Navvying was hard physical labour requiring regular and adequate food. The money was good but often spent in the tavern which invariably belonged to the Railway. The speaker delivered a very vivid picture of the time.

**13 May** brought another visit by Lew Lawton, a speaker from Swindon, who has recently visited China with a cycling expedition. His subject, The Terracotta Army of Qin Shi Huang is not merely a load of old ceramics. 240 to 221 years B.C. Qin conquered and united the greater part of China – indeed Shi is the root of the word China. The warriors, 8000 soldiers and horses etc, were set up at Xi'an to guard his tomb. Unfortunately a subsequent emperor of the Han dynasty had them smashed. Since 1974 when they were recently uncovered archaeologists have had the painstaking task of reconstructing them from shards. Lew also showed images of modern China and an explanation of written Chinese characters.

**On 27 May** Malcolm Lewis from Cirencester Probus gave a talk 'Birmingham, a City of Culture'. Malcolm grew up in Smethwick and his nostalgia for this Area was evident. He began with the local industries: Glass and steel for the Crystal Palace and the Houses of Parliament, pen nibs by the million, screws and fastenings by G.K.N., Avery scales and weighbridges, Engines by Boulton, Watt and Tangye, cycles and saddles, Ruskin pottery, Murdoch gas lighting, all served by canals developed by Bradley, Smeaton and Telford. Mitchell the founder of the brewery was a great benefactor. Smethwick had famous politicians: Suffragette Cristobel Park Hurst, Oswald Moseley and Patrick Gordon Walker. Alfred Dobbs (Labour) died in a crash the day after his election. Malcolm X visited in 1964 and was assassinated in the U.S. 9 days later. Musicians and entertainers born in Smethwick included Charlie Chaplin, Albert Katelbey (In a Monastery Garden) Liza Goddard, Frank Skinner and Julie Waters. Many famous stars 'cut their teeth' at the Victorian built Birmingham Hippodrome – Lawrence Olivier, Sid Field, Noel Coward, Webster Booth and Ronnie Ronald. Our speaker put Smethwick at the spearhead of progress and culture in the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries.

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## Purton & District Gardeners' Guild



The topic for our May meeting was 'Fuchsias' and John Nicholas, editor of the British Fuchsia Society magazine, joined us as guest speaker. John has been growing fuchsias for over 30 years and advised us that there are a staggering 15,000 named fuchsias, 5000 of which are still in cultivation across the world.

He began his talk by demonstrating the process of producing new fuchsia plants from cuttings. He uses a mixture of 2 parts moss peat, 1 part grit and 1 part of vermiculite, for the purpose. A non-flowering shoot approximately 4" long is taken from the parent plant cutting neatly above a bud. Trim below a leaf joint or node to make a cutting about 2-4" long. After removing the bottom leaves and pinching out the soft tip, the cutting should be placed in a propagator. This can be something as simple as a small plastic drink's glass placed on top of the plant pot holding the cutting or even a plastic bag held in place with a rubber band. The compost should be kept moist until the cutting is well rooted.

As the cutting grows it will need to be potted on and this was demonstrated by placing an empty pot of the same size as that holding the cutting into a pot one size larger and filling around the gap between the two with compost. When the empty pot is lifted out the cutting can be transferred into the space left behind causing the least disturbance for the roots. Transferring a cutting into a pot that is too large would encourage the roots to grow down to the bottom of the pot and curl around the base and with too much compost in the pot, the roots stay wetter for longer and fuchsias are known to grow at their best when they are only just ready for watering.

John continued his talk describing the features of some the many types of fuchsias available today including:

- Fuchsia Excorticata, a New Zealand species plant that will grow to 40-50 feet. The bright blue pollen from the flowers is used by the Maori for face paint.
- Ornamental foliage varieties, such as the hardy 'Tom West' with its purple-veined, cream and light green variegated leaves, and 'Sun Ray', John's particular favourite, with its red, green and cream foliage.
- Encliandra hybrids often described as the miniature or dwarf-flowered fuchsias. They are primarily from high up in the mountain regions of Mexico where it's cool, dry and foggy and so are hardy to our climate. After the blooms fall off there is an abundance of small, edible sweet berries
- Standard fuchsias, these can be mini, quarter, half or full, depending on the stem length achieved. One mini standard bears John's name. He considers 'John Nicholas' to be a difficult variety, much as himself! (John's own words I hasten to add).
- Triphylla types such as 'Eruption' are small shrub plants. They can grow as high as two or three feet.
- Half-hardy trailing fuchsias. Their advantage is that they flower in clusters above two shoots and as they are free flowering are ideal for hanging containers. Together with their toleration of direct sun and heat they are favoured by parks departments.

- Small pot cultures that allow you to grow fuchsias in a variety of shapes, fan, conical – half way between a pillar and pyramid, and ring shaped formed around a wire frame.

A most informative talk was followed by a slide show highlighting many aspects of John's talk with glorious examples of a multitude of flowering fuchsias in all shapes and sizes including the triphylla 'Thalia', the hardy upright 'Snowcap' and the trailer 'Swingtime'.

Leon Slee kindly proposed a vote of thanks for a most enjoyable evening, the number of questions raised and answered by John indicating the level of interest in this subject.

It remained for John to judge our competition, 'A Spring Arrangement', not an easy task for him given the number of beautiful entries. Congratulations to our worthy winners, 1<sup>st</sup> Maureen Griffin, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lorna Comley and 3<sup>rd</sup> Janice Simpkins.

We meet again on at 7.30 pm on 22 July in the Silver Threads Hall when Andrew Bullock will be presenting a talk on 'Lavenders and Buddleia' and our competition will be 'A Lavender-Themed Craft'.
