Parish Council News



Purton & Cricklade Dog Awareness campaign – Purton and Cricklade Councils are putting the spotlight on dog awareness. A reminder ...

Short story competition – Children and adults can enter the competition to win cash prizes – £30, £20 and £10 book vouchers. People living in the Parish are invited to write an article or story entitled 'There's No Such Thing as a Dog Poo Fairy'. The articles/stories that take the 1st prize in both the adult and child categories will also be published in a future edition of Purton Magazine. Purton Cemetery Path – Purton Parish Council is arranging for the paths in the cemetery to be resurfaced in the spring – exact date not yet confirmed. The section of pathway leading up to the Memorial Garden is currently narrower than elsewhere causing some difficulty for wheelchair and other access to the garden and cremation plots behind. This path will be widened slightly during the renovations. During this work the row of cremation memorials nearest to the path will be temporarily moved a foot or two back from the path to ensure they are not damaged.

The Diocesan authorities have been consulted and are happy with this precautionary measure, as there will be no disturbance to any burial plots and the memorials will be repositioned exactly where they are now after the path is re-laid. The owners of these burial plots will be notified. Once the exact dates for the resurfacing are known they will be publicised as there may be some restricted access to the cemetery while the works are carried out. If you have any concerns please contact The Parish Clerk.

Restrop Road, Community Speed Watch Scheme – the Parish Council is looking to start up another CSW on Restrop Road. We already have a few volunteers but need some more to get it up and running. If you would like to volunteer please contact us on 01793 772646, or e-mail admin@purtonpc.eclipse.co.uk

Community Speed Watch (CSW) Operation Harness Day of Action – A day of action under Operation Harness was successfully carried out across Swindon and Wiltshire on Tuesday 20 January with the aim of raising speed awareness and educate drivers about road safety. The operation involved over 170 Community Speed Watch (CSW) volunteers and 50 Wiltshire Police officers who carried out roadside checks throughout the day.

As a result 208 vehicles were caught speeding, 147 vehicles were stopped with 132 drivers given warnings about their speed. Other issues identified included defective lights, not wearing a seatbelt, and a defective number plate.

Speeding is one of the 'fatal four' factors that can cause road traffic collisions. The others are drink/drugs, driving while on a mobile phone and not wearing seatbelts. Thank you to all who took part.

Brockhurst Meadow – The Parish Council is extremely disappointed to have to inform you that the beautiful natural meadow at Brockhurst has been sold without our knowledge by Wiltshire Wildlife Trust to a local landowner. We are upset that

we were not informed in advance nor given the opportunity to consider purchasing this local landmark for the Parish.

e-cigarettes banned – At the Parish Council meeting on 9 February 2015 Purton Parish Council voted to ban smoking of e-cigarettes from all Parish Council premises, grounds and vehicles. This follows uncertainty worldwide about possible health risks relating to their use. The Parish Council has followed the lead from Wiltshire Council to ban the use of e-cigarettes.

News From The Trustees

Purton War Memorial and Village Centre

We are very disappointed with all the litter that gets left at the Village Centre. We have such lovely facilities there for all to enjoy – a centre that was bought by the village for the village after the last war and was a War Memorial to the men who gave their lives in the 1939-45 war so that we can live the lives we have today. It is a shame that some people treat it like a rubbish dump – there are litter bins for the rubbish, although these seem a waste of time when litter is thrown anywhere. People have even been seen dumping litter out of their cars and there are those who are a few yards from the bin on the skate park and choose to throw their rubbish on the ground – this even includes the smashing of bottles. It's such a pity to spoil such a nice area and also to give our groundsmen all the extra work of clearing up.

We are trying to make more of a bond between the users of the Centre and the Trustees. Dave Woolford, who is vice chair, and myself are meeting with the Clubs individually – before, we all used to meet collectively but this did not work very well. The meetings tended to get taken over by one particular issue and there wasn't time for everyone to be heard and also it was difficult to arrange an evening when everyone could attend. The new system appears to be more successful and we have now met all four parties.

The Village Hall

We are looking into installing a loop system for those with hearing aids (I am looking after myself). We want it to be the right type for the Hall with our first effort and with no short cuts.

Another item we are looking into is the heating system, only the one we have now is not very satisfactory – you are either too warm sat on top of the radiators (not literally!) or, if you sit away from them you are cold. Also they are noisy when they are working, so watch this space.

It was lovely seeing the hall used in such a manner as it was for King Arthur – the pantomime put on by PADS. When you think about all the preparation that goes into putting on a show like that it is a credit to them all and what is good is that they had some new faces. I am sure that mingling the existing members with the new ones will stand them in good stead for the future – it came through to me that it was a marvellous team effort so congratulations to all concerned.

Housing for Purton People

I am often told that there are not enough properties, of the right type and size, available for Purton people to rent or buy in the parish.

With the development at Ridgeway Farm there will be several tranches of Affordable Houses, released as the site is developed, which will be to rent and also there will be some NewBuild Homebuy and these will be available for people who live in Purton or have a Parish connection. There are and will be also similar housing at Moredon Bridge (Moulden View).

In total at Ridgeway Farm there will be 210 units of which 20% will be NewBuild Homebuy and at Moredon Bridge there will up to 88 units of which 40 should be Shared Ownership. There is a good range and variety of properties, from 1-bed, 2-bed, 3-bed, 4-bed homes and Extra Care units, giving a variety and scope for all ages.

The council has a Housing Allocation Policy which was renewed last year and came into force as from 9 December 2014. The process to implement the new Housing Allocation Policy was to (1) invite current housing applicants to re-apply and (2) advise some current applicants who were adequately housed that, as they had no housing need, their applications would be closed. The Policy means that people who live in a parish or have a local connection with a parish on grounds of employment or residence of close family members (parents, grandparents, adult children) have the greatest priority for vacant properties in that parish. If people with a local connection to the parish itself do not bid, those with a connection to adjacent parishes have priority for vacant properties, with those without a local connection having the least priority. There are some exemption policies for those who are homeless etc. however with the number of properties at Ridgeway Farm and Moredon Bridge there should be more than enough to satisfy all of the needs of the parish for some years to come.

At Ridgeway the first tranche has already been released and occupied.

The key point is that if you are looking for an affordable home and are eligible to apply then you need to be on the Housing Register as soon as practicable. People may apply online at www.homes4wiltshire.co.uk and it is essential to submit ID, proof of address/income and other documents proving residency or connection to Purton or to an adjacent parish.

Please let others know about this information so that Purton people do not miss out on this opportunity.

A Lifeline Service!

Swindon Dial A Ride provides door to door transport for people of any age who are unable to use existing public transport due to a temporary or permanent impairment or disability. Community Transport provides a vehicle hire service for local community groups.

Our fleet of fully accessible minibuses travel throughout the Swindon Borough including Purton and the Lydiards. The Dial A Ride Bus service can be used for a variety of purposes, such as travelling to work or training, going shopping or social activities like the cinema or bingo. The service runs Monday to Saturday 9 am to 5 pm; to book a journey simply call at 10 am the day before you would like to travel.

To use Dial A Ride you will need to register with us. For a FREE registration pack or further information please telephone 01793 616050 after 12 noon.

Community Transport has a range of wheelchair accessible minibuses that any voluntary or community group in the local area can hire. Perhaps you run a scout group or a senior citizens club? The minibus would allow you to take your group on a day trip or longer, maybe to the seaside or for a cream tea at the local garden centre.

Additionally, we have an Access Car available for hire to individuals, small groups or families where one member has a disability. It is particularly suitable for people who need to travel in their wheelchair.

The hired vehicles can be used to travel anywhere in mainland Britain and could mean that a family member or friend can join you on a weekend break or summer holiday.

Can you spare a little time during the week to befriend someone who may be housebound and lonely? Could you step in to support someone who has just come out of hospital? I have been asked by Age UK and Carer Support Wiltshire to do a bit of advertising for them. Annie and Jane's contact details are below, or call me, Ellen, on 07557 110414 for an informal chat.

Volunteers needed in this area for our Home from Hospital Service

This service is being offered to older people who have been discharged from hospital and are worried about how they will manage when they return home. Volunteers will provide short term support for 4-8 weeks, assisting the service user to regain the independence they had before the admission to hospital. An example of this would be doing someone's shopping for the first two weeks, and then accompanying them on a shopping trip on the third week. Annie and Jane, the Discharge Support Caseworkers, will support volunteers every step of the way.



Would this type of role suit your skills and experience?

How much time and commitment is involved?

Purton Magazine 10 Years Ago ... The March 2005 issue of *Purton Magazine* carried the sad news of the death of Roy Blake. There must be a growing number of readers who do not know about Roy but we all owe the very existence of this magazine to him.

Roy was appointed Vicar of St Mary's Purton in 1974 and arrived from St Agnes' church in the multi-racial area of St Paul's in Bristol where he is remembered for starting the St Paul's festival which became Bristol's answer to the Notting Hill festival in London. It would be hard to find two more contrasting parishes, particularly as Roy succeeded Canon Willis who had been living in the parish since 1927.

On page 3 of this issue you will see that *Purton Magazine* was first published in 1975. With the help of Anthony Keast the then Methodist minister, Roy expanded the previous St Mary's church magazine with its limited circulation and set the foundations for the publication that you are reading today.

Roy is still fondly remembered by many from his 19 years as Vicar of St Mary's, not least for some of his more unusual fund raising initiatives. For example, he sat all day on a lavatory in the High Street lay-by opposite College Farm to collect money for the external toilet that was soon added to the church building. There is so much more that Roy achieved for our village, a fraction of which can be found in the article published 10 years ago which can be accessed on line – as detailed in the box below.

10 years ago, we repeated the news that the heir to the throne, Prince Charles, had become engaged to Camilla Parker Bowles – or as the local edition of the *Bristol Evening Post* had simply stated, "Tetbury man to wed."

Gaffer's Tales

You may remember the cow called Daisy had a heifer calf. The calf lay for a while at her mother's feet while she was well and truly licked all over. The bond between them was fixed. After a little while the calf tried to stand up, very shakily at first, falling over in a heap several times, but eventually she did stand, and with a few nudges from mum found the teats and pretty soon was sucking away, filling up with milk. It is very important for a calf to get this first milk as it contains a lot of nutrients and antibodies that are vital to a new born calf, or any other animal. This first milk is rich and is called colostrum. So Daisy's calf has a good start in life.

As a female she will be reared to eventually join the herd. If the calf was a bull, he would have been sold at market, and probably been reared for veal or beef. Veal calves are only fed on milk, as this makes the meat a white colour. If there are two female calves born, they are known as Freemartins, and are not able to breed because their reproductive organs are not complete. These too would have been sold on.

Anyway, Daisy's calf is fine. She will not have a name because the herd is growing larger and sometimes it is hard to identify individuals; she will get a number when she grows up a bit. All calves have a tag in their ear for identification, and strange as it seems, they are given a passport by the ministry of Agriculture, (DEFRA), and everything in their life, such as change of ownership, has to be recorded.

Just a point of interest, Daisy's assisted calving, as described in my last tale, is quite common, but most calving occurs with no help from anyone. Sometimes a cow cannot give birth at all, and the calf is born through the side by caesarean section. This is quite interesting to see, as the cow is standing up through the whole thing, and is only given a local anaesthetic. It involves quite a large incision, and much skill by the vet. He has to avoid cuts to the cow's stomachs (a cow has four) and various other bits, and with the help of the farmer, gently remove the calf through her side. Then he has to sew up all the layers he has cut through. I have seen several of these procedures; there isn't as much blood flowing about as you might think. This operation is quite common now, and is usually satisfactory in the outcome.

Well, that's enough for now, cheerio.

Our first meeting of 2015 began with a short AGM when the existing committee was re-elected en bloc, with the exception of Linda Roberts, who announced her resignation as chair due to work and personal commitments. We will miss Linda on our committee but look forward to seeing her at the regular monthly meetings and she was warmly thanked by David Herbert for her contribution to the running of the club. Congratulations to Moira White who was nominated to replace Linda and subsequently elected. Moira is a well-known member of the club having served as secretary for a number of years and we look forward to her returning to the committee.

Congratulations were offered to Maureen Griffin who was the overall competition winner for 2014 and received the Competition cup.

Having dispensed with the AGM formalities we settled down to welcome local resident Dave Seviour who joined us to present a talk and slideshow on the subject of 'An Alphabet of British Curiosities'. Dave explained how he set out to drive around the country in search of suitable entries for the talk along with his 'Sat Nav', aka Bernice, his wife. This appears to have been a successful arrangement, despite the occasional swift instruction to follow a route to obtain as in one case, **Q** for Quoditch, a hamlet located in Devon, where it took 23 minutes to reach but just seconds to pass through!!

Starting with **A** for Avebury with its 96 sarsen stones, Dave's talk included information and slides highlighting 44 curiosities in 37 locations across 17 counties in three countries of the British Isles, and all in under 1 hour. Some of the more well-known 'curiosities' included: **D** for Durdle Door, with its natural limestone arch on the Jurassic coast in Dorset; **G** for Gretna Green famous for its runaway marriages; **L** for the Lundy lighthouse with the highest foundations of any lighthouse in the country; **P** for Portmeirion, the Italianate style village in North Wales designed by Sir Clough Williams-Ellis and made famous by the TV series 'The Prisoner' and **S** for Snowdon with its Swiss constructed mountain railway.

X could have proved to be a difficult acquisition, but in this case Dave highlighted the Eleanor crosses erected by Edward 1 to the memory of his devoted wife who had died following him to Scotland in 1290. Having arranged for his wife's body to be returned to London, Edward ordered crosses to be erected at each of the resting places where the procession stopped along the route, hence the 'Eleanor crosses'. The final stop on the journey was at Charing Cross where a Victorian replica now stands.

Within the talk, Dave managed to include his birthplace of Harmston, Fingals Cave off the Isle of Mull, where he and Bernice experienced a somewhat dodgy navigation to acquire his stunning photo and the Glenfinnan viaduct, the best preserved rail line in the world, built by McAlpine.

If you are interested in gardening and would like to join us, our next meeting will be on Tuesday, 24 March at 7.30 pm In Silver Threads Hall, when Jeff Hobson will be joining us as speaker. Purton Historical Society



Thursday 22 January 2015 – The Empire Theatre - Roger Trayhurn

Roger Trayhurn gave an excellent, very well researched and entertaining presentation on the Swindon Empire Theatre which was located in the centre of Swindon, at the northern end of Victoria Road on the corner of Clarence Street and Groundwell Road. The theatre was built in 1897/1898 and was originally called The Queens Theatre. It catered for audiences of up to 1600 people. In 1907, it was re-named Empire Theatre and continued operating as a theatre and also in later years as a cinema until its demolition in 1959.

The full story is told by Roger and another local historian Mark Child in a new book called 'All for the Empire', beginning with its creation on the orders of a young entrepreneur called Ernest Carpenter.

Roger has compiled a complete list of Empire shows from the first – the pantomime Dick Whittington on 7 February 1898 – to the last, which was another pantomime, Robinson Crusoe.

The Empire saw countless appearances by familiar names, sometimes long before they became big stars. The list is endless – Betty Driver, Frankie Howerd, Norman Wisdom, Bill Maynard, Hughie Green, Bernie Winters, Tommy Trinder, Max Wall, Beryl Reid, Vera Lynne, Laurel & Hardy and many more. Roger showed one photograph of an appearance by a very young Diana Fluck later to be known as Diana Dors.

Eventually the Empire, like many other provincial theatres, succumbed to changing tastes and, crucially, the unstoppable rise of television. It closed in 1955, the building became derelict, and was demolished in June 1959.

'All for The Empire' is published by Hobnob Press, ISBN 978-1-905978-27-3 and is priced at £14.95.

Purton has a map produced just about the time of the enclosures. Marion Hobbs has walked several of the footpaths and taken photographs of buildings in that period and historic features since then. We will try to visualise who used these footpaths and why.

Great War Project

Part 20: March 1915

Spanbroekmolen – 12 March

James Pound enlisted in peacetime in 1906 at the age of 17 years, 11 months. He was born in Purton the son of Charles and Elizabeth Pound and his occupation was given as agricultural labourer. He had arrived in France in August 1914 with the 1st Battalion Wiltshire Regiment, was wounded in action on 31 October 1914 and transferred to the UK on 9 November 1914 with a gunshot wounds to the right groin and left finger. On 10 February 1915 he rejoined the 1st Battalion at Loche (Loker), Belgium, part of a replacement draft of 34 men.

On 12 March 1915, the 1st Battalion was at Kemmel, Belgium, about 6 miles southwest of Ypres. James Pound's company left billets at Loker at 2.45 am and marched 2½ miles via Kemmel to a section in front of Spanbroekmolen, near Wijtschate on the Messines-Ypres road arriving at dawn (5.30 am) and occupied trenches with the Worcestershire Regiment to their right. Mist delayed an artillery bombardment but by 2.30 pm it was clear enough for the artillery bombardment to begin and continue till 4.10 pm with field guns firing shrapnel to cut the enemy wire, and high explosives to beat down the German trenches. At 4.10 the infantry assault was launched but failed to reach its objectives and they withdrew under heavy fire at 7 pm.

The Wiltshires returned to billets at Loker having lost 32 killed, 48 wounded and 12 missing. James Pound was among those killed, aged 26. He has no known grave but is remembered on the Menin Gate at Ypres (Panel 53). Wiltshire Regiment records in Salisbury list a grave for James: "Spanbroek Molen. 2500 yards E of Lindenhoeck near Kemmel. Not marked." A number of men who died on this date, and were recorded as buried at the same location, can be found in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemetery at La Laiterie. This cemetery was used at the end of the war to concentrate many burials from around the Kemmel area. There are 180 burial plots that are not identified; simply a Soldier of the Great War. James could possibly lie under one of these stones.*

The Battle of Neuve-Chapelle – 11-13 March

Spanbroekmolen was an ancillary attack within the Battle of Neuve-Chapelle. More troops had arrived from Britain and relieved French forces in Flanders, forming a continuous 35-mile British line from just north of Ypres south to Givenchy-lès-la-Bassée. The BEF launched an offensive at Neuve-Chapelle, 20 miles south of Ypres (and 14 miles south of Spanbroekmolen), to break through the German lines and rush on to the Aubers Ridge and possibly Lille. The French Tenth Army's involvement was reduced to heavy artillery support due to lack of troops that had not been relieved from British sectors.

Neuve-Chapelle was the first deliberate British offensive of the war and showed the new method of offense on the Western Front. The First Army prepared the

attack with great attention to detail and achieved tactical surprise and a breakthrough. After the first planned attack, unexpected delays slowed operations, communication failures hindered the command structure as the telephone system broke down. The German defenders were reinforced and dug a new line behind the British break-in.

Elsewhere on the Western Front: On 7 March the Royal Flying Corps made their first tactical bombing raids in support of ground troops in Menin and Courtaix.

In March 1915, the following Purton men were mobilised to France:

Edwin Frank Brown, 7th Battalion Middlesex Regiment

George Edward Butcher, 2nd Battalion Wiltshire Regiment.

John Davies, 4th Battalion Gloucestershire Regiment

Arthur James Gunter, Wiltshire Regiment.

Denis Law, 3rd Battalion Wiltshire Regiment, Labour Corps.

Percy Charles Matthews, 2nd Battalion Wiltshire Regiment.

Albert James Parsons, 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps.

Ernest Ponting, Royal Field Artillery.

In the Turkish Sector: Things were hotting up out east. On 4 March the French government decided to send an Expeditionary Force to the Dardanelles. And on the 5th the Greek government offered naval and military forces for operations there. Britain also commenced a naval bombardment of Smyrna (Izmir) lasting from 5 - 9 March.

Britain had landed 2 battalions of the Royal Marines on the Turkish island of Lemnos on 23 February to plan an assault at the Dardanelles to destroy the Turkish gun batteries. On 7 March, Greece requested an explanation of the Lemnos landings which Britain explained on 9 March to be a military necessity, and on 20 March, Britain guaranteed that Lemnos would be given to Greece after the war.

General Sir Ian Hamilton was appointed on 12 March to command the military operations at Gallipoli and took command on 17 March. Meanwhile on 13 March the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force sailed from Egypt.

An allied naval attack in the Dardanelles was repelled on 18 March by the Turkish shore batteries and the British battleships HMS Irresistible and HMS Ocean and the French battleship Bouvet were all sunk by Turkish mines.

Also on 18 March General Sir John Nixon was appointed to command the British and Indian forces in Mesopotamia. The German General, Liman von Sanders was appointed to command Turkish forces at Gallipoli on 25 March. We shall meet these names again.

Between March and May 1915, the Russian Navy's Black Sea Fleet began seaplane carrier raids against the Bosphorus and the Ottoman Empire's European Black Sea coast. This was the first time that battleships played a subsidiary role to plane carrying ships.

On the political front, on 4 March, the Russian government laid claim to Constantinople to which Britain and France agreed on 14 March. Eyeing up future territory, France lodged a claim with Britain for control of Syria and Cilicia (south-western Turkey) on 17 March.

At Sea, Britain began a blockade of German East Africa on 1 March and on 11 March announced a blockade of all German ports. Off the coast of Chile, the Royal Navy cornered the German light cruiser SMS Dresden at the Chilean Robinson Crusoe Island (Más a Tierra). This, the last surviving ship of the German East Asia Squadron, was left with no option but to scuttle on 14 March. On 28 March a British passenger ship, RMS Falaba was sunk by a German submarine in the middle of the St George's Channel between Wales and Ireland. In response, Britain declared a complete embargo on international trade with Germany to which the Americans objected. Following a short political crisis, Britain and America agreed that the US would only export rubber to Britain.

Our Family's War

Libbie Sheppard has provided us with the following letters from her Grandpa, Roger Morton (b. 1893), who wrote frequently to a friend named Russell Smith, who kept them so we still have access to them. Roger had joined up in September 1914 and was obviously frustrated at not being at the front as we can see from this snapshot of March 1915, when he would have been about 22, and at the rank of sergeant:

Birkenhead February 1915

I am not gazetted to the battalion, it is only a reserve one, really I am in the 1st Cheshires and I am only gazetted here for duties till there is a vacancy for me in the 1st, which is out at the front now.

Birkenhead 3rd March 1915

I had a nice slack week-end at 168, sat and talked and smoked all Saturday and Sunday. I'm working pretty hard, averaging 8 hours per day, and some days more, teaching these blessed recruits how to wield a gun. How long I'm going to be here I don't know but I wish with all my heart to go out as unless one does go, there is no promotion after it. I have at last had my photo taken, I hope it will be a good one. You say something about tea for lady friends, tea for lady friends indeed! I don't think a lady has been to this place since the days of Eve and goodness only knows when there will be another here.

Lingdale House, Birkenhead 10th March 1915

The above address is my new billet, I've been moved to another Co'y and am in an empty house. (I mean empty from a civilian point of view.) We have about 20 men here and four of us sleep and eat in one room, so we pig it a bit as you might expect. We don't mess till 8 and finish about 9, so I go to bed as soon as I can. The work with this company is not as strenuous as the other, but it's rather more boring as it's nearly all musketry and that is the most boring thing going.

Birkenhead 17th March 1915

I've just had a pretty hard day, been on the range from 8.30 am till 4.30 pm with an hour for lunch, putting men through a musketry course – then from 4.45 to 6 pm shooting, myself, with a revolver, then I boxed, and now I'm trying to scribe to you. Thank goodness one of our men has gone out to the front so there are only three of us in the room now. Nine of our fellows went out last week so I expect my turn will not be long in coming. I certainly think I shall get out, we haven't nearly finished with the 'Boches' yet, in fact I think we have the dickens of a job before us. I'm going to the theatre with Alice tomorrow – 'The Cinema Star' – I don't know what it will be like. I'm having a pretty good time considering we're at war, and I hope to go out and fight anytime now.

Purton Scarecrow Trail 2014 ... and 2015?

The Purton Scarecrow Trail fundraising initiative is going well. The Committee has decided to use the money raised to buy a heart defibrillator for Purton which would be available 24 hours a day for use by anyone in the village in an emergency. This life-saving equipment can be used if someone collapses due to a heart attack and needs their heart restarting and would be located in an easily accessible site in Purton. As the project was so “heart-warming” in the pleasure it gave to everyone involved, we thought that equipment related to “heart-saving” would be good use of the money. This is especially appropriate as two of the committee members (Ali Bunce & Ali Davies) work in the NHS.

We raised £470 during the scarecrow trail weekend, £40 from other sources, and also received a very generous individual donation of £100 from a villager (who wishes to remain anonymous). We have also received two wonderful offers from Purton residents. James Phipps (Chief Executive Officer of Excalibur Communications) has generously offered to personally match any future funds raised to reach our original target and Gary Phillips (Phillips & Sutton Ltd) has made an extremely generous donation to ensure enough money is available to make up the amount needed to purchase and install the defibrillator.

An organisation called Community Heartbeat (The Community HeartBeat Trust) will help us to arrange the purchase, installation and maintenance of the defibrillator including training sessions regarding its use (www.communityheartbeat.org.uk).

We do not want to interfere with the Trail run by Purton Stoke so we shall discuss that with their committee. Any feedback from Purton residents would be welcome, as would any offers of donations toward the defibrillator maintenance fund because money will eventually be required for repairs, replacement parts and future training (info@purton-scarecrow.co.uk). We shall also be running a training session around use of the defibrillator for those who are interested once it is installed.

Purton & District Probus



The meeting on **13 January** was addressed by our own member John Clark, known for his previous talks on metal detecting, including a Saxon burial at Wroughton, and techniques for building the Pyramids.

The subject on this occasion was “Too-da-loo – A French village during WW1”. It was inspired by John’s happening across, some years ago, a war memorial at Lue in the Aquitaine region of France. In 1914 Lue was a small hamlet with a population of 149 souls. Of these 66 men formed a typical Pals’ regiment and set off for the war. They were posted into the 13th Infantry Battalion of the 6th Army but many volunteered as a band of brothers to become “Nettoyeurs de Tranchees” meaning Trench Cleaners. Their task was to rid any trench that had been overrun or abandoned of any enemy threat, ambush or booby-trap. The work was extremely dangerous and the chance of survival slim. There were many types of booby-trap. Sometimes they would raid to gather intelligence or capture an enemy soldier, but in general the policy was to take no prisoners. They were free to choose their own weapons almost always a stabbing blade for a silent approach but also a hand gun and grenades. They often wore a close fitting steel helmet for stream-lined manoeuvrability. Sadly the war memorial at Lue recorded 61 names indicating that only 5 men returned alive. Aquitaine is an area of reclaimed marshes. In 1914 the men were mainly employed in sheep farming and forestry. It is therefore hard to imagine how such men became commando-type killers (Zigouilleurs). Perhaps it was the mind-set associated with the vendetta for they certainly had a feud against the Nazis. When John, more recently, paid a second visit to Lue, he was disappointed to find that it was not how he remembered it. His original pictures of the hamlet and The War Memorial, shown during the talk, needed no up-dating.

On **24 January** the club enjoyed another visit by Bill King. This talk was entitled “Industrial Archaeology in your Garage, Shed or Attic”. Bill structured his talk as a chronological march through time identifying archaeological evidence of man’s activities from the Neolithic age and the Druids up to the present age of electronic communication and space travel. The early evidence is shaped in the land, eg; Silbury Hill, Avebury and Stonehenge. Constructions of this magnitude would have required a large and well-disciplined work force, powerful leaders and knowledgeable architects and engineers. There are lots of other clues in our local landscape:- earthworks, long barrows, strip lynchets, ridge and furrow ploughing as well as the ancient ways and the roman roads.

The talk included images of items found in the Cotswold Water Park:- tools of bone, a scapula used as a shovel, an antler pickaxe, flint axe heads and a bronze dagger expertly fashioned and decorated.

We came now to things we might find in our shed or garage; hand tools for farming, agriculture, wood-work and masonry. Examples illustrated were a scythe, a billhook, wedges for log-splitting, large gimlets for boring dowel holes and draw-knives for shaping seats and wheel spokes. There were also domestic items

such as butter churns, milk churns and skimmers for separating curds and whey. The advent of the Industrial Revolution has created a radical change in archaeological evidence as Machines and Factories have taken over from labour intensive hand working. Most steel items are re-cycled but cast iron seems to stay in evidence. Bill showed a GWR rail-chair adapted with a brush as a shoe-scraper. An Example of a cast iron gate post can be seen at Coleshill house – it carries the name of the manufacturer “Derby, Colebrook Dale, Staffs”.

Subsequently new materials, first Bakelite and then a variety of plastics appeared. The cradle-telephone is an iconic antique as is the red telephone box. There are still collectors of 78rpm vinyl records, but we are now in the age of composite materials, electronics, solar power and robots. Bill finished with a picture of the artefacts in his own garage, the central feature of which is a 1943 Willys Jeep with American Military markings. He is obviously a dedicated collector.
