Purton Parish Council News

Supporting a Greener Purton

This summer, Purton Parish Council asked residents about which types of eco initiatives they would support, in an online survey.

The survey attracted 38 responses, with the majority (92%) of them online. Of note, was that two thirds of respondents were unaware of Purton Parish Council's aim to be Carbon Neutral by 2030.

Results showed strong support for all measures with water butts, local plant growing, insect and small mammal homes, domestic tree planting and reductions to local pesticide use, topping the list.

More ground level planting, community gardens, and domestic planting to support pollinators were proposed, in order to extend what the completed planter programme had achieved for local bees.

Footpath Team

We have now finished trimming back by hand for this year. There are still some outstanding footpaths that we know are overgrown and in need of strimming which we hope to tackle if the weather improves and they can be safely accessed.

We still have some minor repairs on our list and will continue with those for the time being. Following all the recent rainfall however many areas are very wet, and we won't be going out under those conditions.

We have installed a kissing gate and sleeper bridge on FP70 which goes from Station Road to Collins Lane. We are pleased this adds another stile-free footpath to our network.



During 2023 we will have installed 6 kissing gates, a great achievement. They comprise 5 sponsored gates and one reused from a redundant position. If anyone would like to sponsor a kissing gate, please contact the Purton Parish Council Office. However please be aware they can only be installed with the landowner's permission.

We wish everyone a happy and healthy 2024. Enjoy walking our footpaths.

This Neighbourhood Plan update or 'revision' offers an opportunity for you to have your say and shape the future of our village regarding housing and amenities. For example, you can use this chance to say that retirement homes, affordable accommodation, green

Purton Institute and Village Hall Charity installs new heaters

This month the Trustees of the Purton Institute and Village Hall (Charity, reg no 203202) have funded the installation of a new heating system.

The new heaters will support sustainability by running on renewable electric energy and offering greater efficiency by maintaining heat in their ceramic core, once warmed.

Smaller than the previous less efficient heaters, they offer increased floor space for events, as well as a quieter solution to warming the hall.

Hall users need not worry about setting the temperature or turning off the new units, as they will be controlled by an app and set up in advance of bookings.

Rise Trust Youth

Our Youth Sessions will continue to operate from the Millenium Hall on Thursday nights from 7.00pm – 8.30pm for year 7s and above and remain FREE to attend.

As a reminder, the Christmas two week closure will be reduced to just one week (w/c 25th December) and sessions will return in the week beginning 3rd January 2024.

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Update on the Banking Hub

The last bank standing in Royal Wootton Bassett closed its doors back in December 2022. As a customer I was shocked, as too were the many people I spoke with and who lobbied me to do something! I contacted James Gray, MP, for his support and he was able to put me in touch with a company who is delivering Banking Hubs across the UK. Together with Cllrs Bucknell we worked with this company to identify a building in RWB that might work as a Banking Hub. During 2023 we were kept informed of progress but unable to release information due to the sensitive nature of the location. However, finally we are delighted to be able to announce that the Hub will be at 33 High Street, in the same building and next door to the existing Post Office.

When the hub opens, hopefully in the New Year, it will offer a counter service operated by the Post Office, where customers of all major banks and building societies can carry out regular cash transactions. It will also offer a Community Banker service where customers can talk to their own bank about more complicated issues, Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm. The Community Bankers will work on rotation, with a different bank or building society available on each day of the week:

- Monday: Nat West
- Tuesday: TBC
- Wednesday: Barclays
- Thursday: Lloyds
- Friday: HSBC

A statement made by Cash Access UK when they released the news included:

"Finding the right location for a Banking Hub that is convenient, accessible and works for everyone often takes time, so Cash Access UK is delighted to have been able to secure convenient premises in the heart of the community. This development is a significant step forward in bringing a Banking Hub to Royal Wootton Bassett.

The team at Cash Access UK are now working hard to fit out the new premises and will update the community on progress and an opening date as soon as they can. The Royal Wootton Bassett Banking Hub page on the Cash Access UK website - Cash Access UK - Royal Wootton Bassett (Wiltshire) – will provide updates as works progress. In the meantime, a temporary Banking Hub is also being considered to provide the community with access to cash whilst plans for the permanent hub continue to progress."

Do you trust a promise?

We live in an age where promises seem to be quickly made and quickly forgotten -circumstances change - what had seemed so sure and certain now is unrealistic and seemingly unreasonable to fulfil. Politicians and advertisers are but two groups amongst many who have a record of unfulfilled promises. Yet before we become critical of others perhaps we need to take a long hard look at ourselves to examine our own record at keeping the promises we have made. Sometimes our response is to demand that others make and keep promises but to do all we can not to make any promises ourselves.

The end result is that promises can become devalued and apparently worthless, in contrast we discover that the events of the first Christmas are all about promises. For those unfamiliar with what took place - God makes promises through His angel messengers to Mary and then to Joseph, and next to a group of shepherds about the birth of His Son - "I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." This promise might have seemed too good to be true but for those shepherds it was worth going to find out if it was true.

They went and checked it out and then "returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told." [Luke chapter 2 verses 10-12 & 20 -The Bible].

This Christmas it is my hope and prayer that we would not dismiss God's promises on the assumption that they are false and worthless but instead that we might all take opportunity to look afresh at the promises God has made, to check them out and to find out if they are true. Please join with us at one of our Christmas services, (some Services also accessible online) as together we look at God's promises to see if they can be trusted and what difference they will make to our lives. And if you would like to explore further we are continuing The Bible Course on Thursday evenings after Christmas. Christmas choral concerts

December Nature Correspondent

"These are a few of my favourite things"

Sometime in December, as the first "Robin in the snow" Christmas cards drop through the letter-box, I thumb through the diary and recollect the special creatures I have seen over the year and cherish in my mind.

The Robin is not a bad one to start with. It has a song for every season and with that red breast, restless manner and confident behaviour, it's no surprise that it is the Nation's favourite bird.

Amongst our wintering birds is a rather special finch that lingers on till March - the Brambling. I heard its distinctive, nasal "chüp" calls in an area of beeches on a morning walk. After a few minutes it perched on a bare tree with a few similar-looking chaffinches, a male, with a dark head, orange belly and shoulder stripe.

In March, searching for Partridges on the approach to Windmill Hill all I could see on a bare field was a clod of earth. But then it came to life, a lovely Brown Hare with big ears and a lolloping gait.

Spring is the time for the endless singing of the Skylarks and the arrival of our summer visitors. On April 14th a cock Redstart appeared on a barbed-wire fence in a local meadow,

en route no doubt for some distant welsh location. The name "Redstart" refers to its red tail, which shivers and trembles, especially when it's trying to attract a mate.

One of my favourites amongst the many early flowers is the Kingcup, which I usually find in damp river margins alongside clusters of Cowslips.

I see that in May and June I went searching for butterflies in various locations: the list included Marsh Fritillaries, Duke of Burgundy, and best of all the gorgeous Adonis Blue, the bright blue wings brilliant alongside the duller Common Blue.

Spring turned into summer and more memories flood the brain: nesting Swallows in the church

porch, a Hedgehog in a neighbour's drive. Nightjars churring at dusk in a woodland clearing. and then a special moment, as a Kingfisher darted over the water while I plied my rusty angling skills on the River Avon near Amesbury. It brought back another memory from way back, when I was a coarse fisherman, trying my luck with a ledger line on the River Thame in Oxfordshire. I was waiting for the line to twitch and when it did, I looked up and a Kingfisher was perched on the tip of my rod looking keenly

into the water. After that moment I gave up fishing and became a birder!



Community information from Wiltshire Council

Protect yourself and others by getting vaccinated

Eligible people who've not yet come forward for the flu and COVID-19 vaccines are being urged to 'get winter strong' and join the millions of others in taking up the offer ahead of the festive and new year season when flu and COVID-19 are expected to peak.

Eligible people for the flu and COVID-19 vaccines include pregnant women, those aged 65 or over, carers, people with certain health conditions including a learning disability, those who live with someone with a weakened immune system, people living in a care home and frontline health or social care workers. The children's nasal spray flu vaccine is offered every year to protect children against flu. It is for children aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2023, all primary school children and some secondary school aged children.

Recycle batteries responsibly

Take Charge is a national campaign to encourage residents to recycle batteries responsibly.

Batteries contain valuable materials that can be recycled, yet fewer than half of all batteries discarded in the UK are recycled. This is not only wasteful but can be very dangerous. Batteries contaminating household waste or recycling bins can also result in fires or harmful chemicals being released into the environment.

Support this campaign and our goal of recycling more of Wiltshire's waste by making sure you place your batteries in a clear bag on top of your blue lidded bin, or next to your blue weighted bag on collection day.

Battery collection for small batteries are also collected alongside your kerbside recycling collection every fortnight. These should be presented in a sealed clear sandwich bag, on top of your blue-lidded recycling bin (not inside the bin).

We can collect the following size batteries: D, C, AA, AAA, 9V, Button, Rechargeable. Other size batteries (including car batteries) can be recycled at the household recycling centres

Household Recycling Centres switch to their winter opening times

Our Household Recycling Centres (HRCs) have now switched to their annual winter opening hours. The opening hours of all 10 of our HRCs is now 10am to 4pm on each day that they're open.

Like previous years, Salisbury, Trowbridge and Stanton St Quinton HRCs will also be closed for an additional day a week, so will not be open on Thursdays and Fridays. The opening days of the other centres will remain as they are.

If you are visiting one of our recycling centres, please remember to sort your waste before you arrive, so that together we can recycle as much as possible. Also, don't forget to bring proof of your address.

Young people encouraged to stand for election and have their say on local issues

Young people can get involved in local decision making and influence funding for youth projects as part of the Wiltshire Youth Council.

The Wiltshire Youth Council was launched last year, with representatives from secondary schools across the county elected to speak out on issues that are important to them.

Schools are now being invited to encourage 11-17 year-olds to stand for the next election, which takes place between Monday 29 January 2024 and Friday 2 February 2024. There are also three youth councillor community seats available for young people who live in Wiltshire but do not attend school in Wiltshire.

Wiltshire youth councillors have the power to:

- Meet with Wiltshire Council leaders and have their say on local decisions.
- Work with area boards to ensure funding for youth projects has the right impact for them and their peers.

- Inspect services to ensure they represent young people's best interests.
- Easily communicate with their peers so young people's views are properly represented.

Youth councillors will be elected to a one-year term and will be asked to commit one evening per month to attend a full youth council meeting, which will focus on issues important to them. They will also be expected to talk with their peers about issues and represent their views. There will



be training to support youth councillors in their roles, covering topics such as debating, running a youth inspection and delivering presentations.

Current youth councillors have provided valuable input in a wide range of areas including the Wiltshire Healthy Schools programme, the allocation of youth grant funding, mental health services and cost of living advice and support for young people. Wiltshire youth councillors also supported the first ever Wiltshire Youth Pride event and the Youth4Ukraine campaign which raised over £12,000.

Cllr Laura Mayes, Cabinet Member for Children's Services, said: "The best way to ensure that we are meeting the needs of children and young people is to empower them to influence the key decisions that will have an impact on them. The Wiltshire Youth Council gives young people an influential voice that can take forward their priorities in a wide range of areas including transport, climate change, youth services and education.

"We will support anyone who wishes to stand as a Wiltshire youth councillor and we want to encourage a wide range of young people to take part."

Purton & District Probus Club



At our second meeting of October, the 24th, Doctor Ernest Hill, the retired Director of the Centre for Mesoscience & Nanotechnology at the University of Manchester, gave a talk on "Graphene", a two dimensional allotrope of carbon; a single layer of carbon molecules-"The Truth and The Myth".

Graphene is a one-atom-thick layer of carbon atoms arranged in a hexagonal lattice. It is the building block of graphite, which has known and familiar uses, but graphene is a remarkable substance on its own, with a multitude of astonishing properties which has dubbed it a "Wonder Material".

Dr Hill began with an explanation of the atomic structure of Graphene. It consists of a single layer of carbon atoms which can occur in 3 primary/different forms. As a Tubular structure, it can only be grown in one direction. As a layer, it has a two dimensional structure – the most capable for further development. A third atomic structure is as Fullerenes or buckyballs, closed forms of spheres and hollow shapes. Anyone who has drawn on paper has created portions of a single layer of graphene. Dr Hill passed around a sample of graphene, about one millimetre in diameter, taken from graphite by the Scotch Tape Method and still attached to the substrate. This was used to illustrate that although the presence of graphene has been known for 76 years (Phillip Wallace 1947}, the extraction costs have been prohibitive, the layers being very difficult to separate.

However, in 2004, working at Dr Hills own university - Manchester, Andre Geim and Konstantin Novoselov, during a Friday evening off-duty experiment, removed some flakes from a lump of bulk graphite with sticky tape. They noticed that some flakes were thinner than others. By separating the fragments repeatedly they managed to create flakes that were just one atom thick. Their experiment led to Graphene being isolated for the very first time. Geim and Novoselov, in 2010 were awarded the Nobel Prize for this surprising breakthrough.

Graphene, mounted on a substrate, often Silicon Dioxide, is strong, flexible, lightweight, nearly transparent and is an extraordinary conductor of electricity. It has promise as an auto-sun-roof or window blind which can generate its own electrical power. Graphene is made exclusively of Carbon, an element which is quite literally everywhere. Its remarkable characteristics have put it in the centre of cutting-edge research for a whole range of commercial projects.

Researchers, around the world, are struggling with ways of exploiting its commercial promise.

The properties of graphite are wide-ranging. It can achieve tensile strength which is 100 times that of steel; useful in the construction and building industries. It has a high thermal conductivity, favoured for heat-sinks and high temperature applications. The electrical conductivity of a single layer can be 70% higher than that of copper. As a filter, graphene oxide membranes filter out antibodies, heavy metals and other contaminants. They form an effective barrier when handling liquids and gases; hence water treatment plants. In the form of synthetic diamond material it has a hardness suitable for cutting tools, drill bits and emery sheets. As liquid, it can be added to lubricants to improve performance and reduce wear. In paint it can offer resistance to corrosion.

In medicine, targeting for drug delivery is being researched, safer brain surgery, portable self-testing kits and 'smart' implants are expected. In electronics, it can be used as a coating to improve current touch screens on phones and tablets and for circuitry in computers to make them even faster. Items already in use are shoes, fishing rods, skis, bicycle frames and lightweight headphones. Graphene is slowly taking over roles in industry.

Dr Hill's talk was enlightening and hopeful. Keep your eye on the Buckyball.

Ideally half of them would still be out but the farm is currently wetter than anyone can remember - over 300mm of rain in September and October combined. Hopefully the rest of the winter will be cold and dry and some of the cows can go back outside where they can eat the bales of hay which are lined up for them ready to be eaten. Our type of beef cows are happier outside. I plan well in advance where the cows will be through the winter, I choose our drier fields and allow the grass to grow long. In the autumn I place lines of bales out ready to be unrolled. The plan then is that by using electric fences I move the cows each day across the field, this gives them fresh grass and a bale to munch. The long grass and frequent moving prevents damage to the soil. Having said all that I know when I'm beaten so a few weeks inside while its as wet as it is now is fine as a plan B

I let the turkeys out first thing in the morning regardless of the weather. On fine days they mooch in and out as their fancy takes them with mid morning normally being time when all the turkeys are outside foraging. I like seeing the shed completely empty as I know then that they all fully embrace the outdoor life. I'm sure this is because I let them out from three weeks old so being outdoors is where they're happiest. The trouble is that to minimise any risk of avian influenza the feed and water is all inside so the birds keep walking in and out and make the doorways muddy. It doesn't worry them but I'd like to improve the drainage so I don't slip over in the dark when shutting them in for the night!

The sheep have to stay out in all conditions but we were still careful to keep them moving over the ground; again, this is done with electric fencing. Moving the sheep every few days ensures they don't re-graze grass before it has rested and fully recovered. Re-grazing too Pictured: Turkeys enjoy foraging in the dry weather. soon can cause the plant stress, roots contract so it becomes weaker and less resilient. The rest period between the grazing is always a great subject of debate between farmers, essentially it depends on if you're focusing on livestock growth, the quality of the grass in the next grazing period or the biodiversity benefits. I'll stop now or I run the risk of being boring but it's fascinating stuff!

Sales have been great for the turkeys this year and we expect to sell out in the next couple of weeks, so if you're interested please have a look on the website. We're busy making lots of improvements to the shed where we will house our Christmas pop up shop and host our turkey collections, we won't have it quite finished but it will be a massive improvement and we'll be able to offer so much more than previous years.

I'm pleased to report that the trial two day opening of the pop up shop was a great success! We had more customers but more importantly they were spread more evenly across the opening hours. This was really our goal as the shop had become so popular that the first hour was incredibly busy. The 2 day opening meant a more pleasurable experience for customers, staff and our vehicle movement technicians (that's Mum and Dad on the car parking), so if you've not been lately because of the queue, please come again and have a look!

The next openings are 9th and 10th of December 10am-12pm and 22nd and 23rd of December 10am-6pm.

Happy Christmas from everyone at Park Farm and Lydiard Turkeys, and I do hope the new year brings us some drier weather.

Free 'solar powered' energy advice service shortlisted for national award

A free energy advice service run by Wiltshire Wildlife Community Energy (WWCE), one of the county's largest notfor-profit solar energy enterprises, has been named amongst just three national finalists in the Fuel Poverty Action category at the Community Energy England Awards 2023.

The UK wide awards recognise and celebrate outstanding achievements by organisations in the burgeoning

community energy sector, including acknowledging those who have made remarkable contributions to address the multifaceted challenges of fuel poverty and energy efficiency in England. WWCE has been shortlisted for its 'Keeping Warm This Winter' pop-up energy advice initiative which was introduced in November 2022. Led by its carbon reduction champion, the organisation ran a total of 16 sessions



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which helped over 360 residents from Melksham, Purton and surrounding areas to better understand how they could stay warm while reducing their energy bills over the colder months.

The programme proved so successful that it attracted the attention of

Chippenham MP and Secretary of State for Science, Innovation and Technology, Michelle Donelan. Ms Donelan initially wrote to the team to thank them for their efforts and went on to join them for a morning at Melksham Library to see first-hand the positive impact the programme was having.

She said of her visit, "It was great to see for myself the community support being offered by WWCE in Melksham. These energy workshops have been proving invaluable for local people, providing them with the much-needed tools to reduce their bills with advice, tips and support."

Speaking about the award nomination, Julian Barlow Chair of WWCE said, "I'm all too aware of the impact of the energy crisis on the more vulnerable members of our community in Wiltshire, which is why I was so pleased that our community energy group was able to play its part in supporting them over what proved to be a challenging winter. To have our efforts recognised by Community Energy England with this award nomination is fantastic and serves to reinforce our commitment to developing our Keeping Warm This Winter initiative further, offering



practical help and advice to even more of those in need this year and beyond." Winners of the Community Energy England Awards will be announced at a ceremony at the Lowry Theatre in Manchester on Friday 17th November.

WWCE

WWCE develops renewable energy projects to reduce carbon and protect and enhance wildlife habitats and biodiversity in Wiltshire. We concentrate on projects that reduce the impact of climate change and increase our energy security, whilst at the same time generating significant community benefit and supporting the local economy.

We believe a community-owned structure is the right model to create local support for renewable energy installations, and that a local and decentralised supply offers a viable and resilient business model.

Wiltshire Wildlife Community Energy was created in 2013. We adopted 3 rooftop schemes from Wiltshire Wildlife Trust buildings and then set about to develop more local community owned projects. Since then, we have successfully raised the necessary funds and built two community solar farms: Chelworth and Braydon Manor.

Surplus funds generated by our solar farms go into a community fund which other community groups in Wiltshire can apply to use.

The Rotary Club of Royal Wootton Bassett & District has once again proudly sponsored a hands-on engineering workshop delivered by Bloodhound Education to local year



7 students. This is the third successive year of doing so and on this occasion the benefiting school was Bradon Forest School in Purton.

Bloodhound Education is a charity that brings STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) subjects to life. STEM subjects are key skills for the careers of many young people.

Pam, an experienced trainer for Bloodhound Education, presented an engineering overview to all of nearly 200 year 7 students. This was followed with two practical sessions for around half an hour of the year group. In small teams the students had fun building an air powered rocket car using K'nex to be powered by compressed air and capable of travelling a distance of 10m. The sessions concluded with timed runs to determine the overall winner.

During the process, teams were encouraged to think about what they were doing, test their models constantly, observe what happened, learn and redesign to improve. These are the skills that real engineers need.

It was evident the students were fully engaged in what they were doing and thoroughly enjoying the experience. It was very interesting watching the different ways that the students chose to construct their cars. Delivery of the workshops was assisted by Graham, a STEM Ambassador for Bloodhound in addition to assistance from attending Rotary club members.

Mark Mudd and other attending Rotary Club members were delighted with how the students were engaged. "It was a fantastic workshop, enjoyed by everyone and clearly of great value to the students who all embraced the challenge with determination and interest. The quality of the workshop delivered by Bloodhound Education was once again outstanding, and the event was very well organised by the Bradon Forest School"


